
The Children's Bookshow

We hope you have enjoyed <u>The Children's Bookshow</u> with SF Said. Have a go at some of these creative activities inspired by *Tyger* and send us your work. We would love to see it!





Explore

- Read William Blake's poem Tyger, from which SF Said drew his inspiration for this book. How many references to the poem can you spot as you read the story?
- Find out about the history of the British Empire: why it started, how it grew and how it came to an end.
- Visit websites such as BBC Bitesize and CBBC Newsround to read, watch and listen to some first-person accounts of enslavement.

Draw



- Create a symmetrical portrait of the Tyger, like the one by illustrator Dave McKean on the book's cover. Fold an A4 piece of paper in half and re-open it. Paint half the head onto one side, then fold and press down to print the image onto the other side.
- Draw and paint a silhouetted skyline of London against a burning sky (page 225).
- Choose a scene from the story and illustrate it in the style of Dave McKean.

Create



- Create an illustrated map of London, adding the main locations, landmarks and scenes from the story.
- Make the doors of perception, imagination and creation out of folded card. Behind each door, draw your own interpretations of what lies beyond.
- Choose a scene from the story and create a 3D story setting in a shoebox using your choice of modelling materials: clay, junk, Lego, fabrics or collage.

Write



- Read all about tigers and why they are an endangered species at www.wwf.org.uk/learn/fascinating-facts/tigers. Write a fact file to share what you have found out.
- Write your own poem about Tyger, taking inspiration from SF Said's vivid descriptions and Dave McKean's striking illustrations.
- The book is narrated from Adam's point of view. Choose a chapter and rewrite it from another character's point of view, perhaps Zadie, Maldehyde or the Tyger.

Further Activities to Try

- 2. Use Google Earth to explore London and virtually visit the locations featured in the story.
- 3. Watch some nature programmes about tigers to find out more about this amazing creature and why it is in danger of extinction.
- 4. Investigate the history of Tyburn and Ossulstone and find out which famous landmark stands there today.
